Dr. Leon D. Caldwell

Senior Director of Health Equity Strategy and Innovations at the American Hospital
Association and founder of Ujima Developers

Dr. Leon D. Caldwell is an award-winning community-based-researcher, social entrepreneur, and transformational leader. Ujima Developers was founded on the premise that communities can be transformed with intentional investments to improve the life outcomes of residents. Dr. Caldwell has been involved in real estate as a developer, builder, investor, and property manager since 1999.

A West Philadelphia native, Dr. Caldwell graduated from Our Mother of Sorrows, the William Penn Charter School, then received a BA in Economics and M.Ed. in School Counseling from Lehigh University and a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology from Penn



State. Following earning his doctorate, he was a staff psychologist at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. He has held rank and tenure as an Associate Professor at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln; the University of Memphis and directed a community research center at Rhodes College. After a successful career as an Associate Professor, award-winning community-based researcher, national thought leader on Black men and boys health, social entrepreneur and Senior Leader in the Philanthropic sector and author with over 50 national and international publications, he established Ujima Developers, LLC as a public health intervention for blighted neighborhoods.

Kerry Margaret Butch

Program Specialist at the Rutgers Environmental and Occupational Health Sciences Institute

Kerry Margaret Butch is the Community Engagement Coordinator for Rutgers Center for Environmental Exposures and Disease. Her prior positions include serving as the Executive Director of the League of Women Voters of New Jersey (LWVNJ), Urban Project Director of the Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions (ANJEC), Executive Director of the Asbury Park Consortium, and community organizer for the Ironbound Community Corporation and New Jersey Citizen Action. 2009, and assembled the same crew to create "Storming for the Vote: Hurricane Sandy and the Election" for the LWVNJ in 2013. She is also a long-time board member of the New Jersey Environmental Justice Alliance.

Geovanni Cantizano has been active in the field of human services for 25+ years, focusing on assisting individuals



the City of Newark, Appointed by Governor Phil Murphy to serve as Vice-Chair of the NJDEP's Environmental Justice Advisory Council, former Chair of both the Newark Environmental Commission and the Essex County Environmental Commission, a founding member of the New Jersey Environmental Justice Alliance and New Jersey President of the International Black Women's Congress.

Christine Guhl-Sadovy

President of the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities

Christine Guhl-Sadovy was appointed by Governor Phil Murphy as President of the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities in 2023. Prior to her nomination, she served as Cabinet Secretary in the Governor's senior staff. President Guhl-Sadovy previously worked at NJBPU, where she rose to the position Chief of Staff under President Joe Fiordaliso, helping to spearhead Governor Murphy's clean energy agenda. During her time as NJBPU Chief of Staff, Ms. Guhl-Sadovy worked on several key initiatives of the



Administration including the 2019 Energy Master Plan, implementation of the 2018 Clean Energy Act, and development of the State's electric vehicle incentive program.

Prior to serving in the Murphy Administration, Ms. Guhl-Sadovy worked as the Legislative and Political Director for Planned Parenthood Action Fund of New Jersey. President Guhl-Sadovy is a lifelong New Jersey resident. She received her bachelor's degree from Rutgers University and serves on the board of Anchor House, Inc., a Trenton-based youth homelessness organization.

Janel Winter

Assistant Commissioner and Director, Division of Housing and Community Resources, New Jersey Department of Community Affairs

Janel Winter directs the work of the Division of Housing and Community Resources at the Department of Community Affairs. The Division has more than 300 staff and 14 field offices and a portfolio ranging from administration of rental assistance to the Office of Eviction Prevention to housing production funds and much more. Since the start of the pandemic the Division has administered more than \$2 billion in Covid-related assistance funds, including launching, and implementing the \$500 million Eviction Prevention



Program and distributing more than \$750 million in Emergency Rental Assistance Program Funds to more than 80,000 households. Over the past year more than 120,000 households have received rental assistance and more than 300,000 households have received utility assistance through the Division's programs.
